- Pomeroy Foundation Grant: Awarded nearly \$1,800 to the History Department on Sept.
 9th to purchase D-2 Biological Solution for use in cleaning cemeteries. We should be able to purchase at least 40 gallons with this.
- Pomeroy Foundation Historic Marker applications: Deadline is Oct. 1st. The sign for the Ten Broeck Cemetery will be a long shot because there is no public access. The 1845 Cheviot accident, Ice House, and First Reformed cemetery are the other three that will be submitted for review.
- SUNY Geneseo internship program: A professor of history at SUNY Geneseo reached out about a program designed to have students intern with local historians to develop a project about public-facing remembrance of the Revolutionary War in the lead up to 2026. Will get back to him with an idea soon.
- NYS Historic Sign repainting: Done for 2022 with a total of 27 signs repainted. Will seek grants over the winter to purchase more paint for next year. Send Tom suggestions for the to-do list.
- Kiosks: The Roe Jan Park kiosk is ready to go. Construction will begin in the next week or two. The planned Palatine Park/ Maple Avenue kiosk will be built around the same time. Content for the latter kiosk is pretty much complete and ready to be sent to the graphic designer.
- Recent donations: Shane Johnson donated three GCS yearbooks and a file of Stoner Well Drilling Co. records that belonged to his recently deceased uncle, Norman Stoner. Richard Coons donated an antique postal scale.
